

**GERMAN PILOTS TAKE OVER BRITISH
PLANES**

And while the world wonders about Germany's future, a British aerodrome - Thrumpton, in Nants - sees an unusual sight. Fifteen Tiger Moths, all ex-R.A.F. trainers, are taken over by German pilots.

Their tails bear German markings. Squadron Leader Ewan-Webb, of the Wiltshire School of Flying, hands over to ex-Luftwaffe bomber pilot Captain Bernhard Schlegel, who will lead the flight to Germany. Werner Wegmann of Essen is ready to go; so is Hans Stamer of Bonn. Many German pilots have made the one-way trip, but it's sixteen years since they did it this way round.

The aircraft are going to Father Schulte, West Germany's Flying Priest, whose ambition is to make Germany's youth air-minded.
