

ADENAUER IN MOSCOW.

After four days of hard bargaining, West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer goes to the last session of his Moscow talks with Marshal Bulganin. Plain speaking on both sides, and a few bitter exchanges has led many to expect the talks to end in deadlock.

With Bulganin at the final talks are Khrushchev, the Soviet Communist Party secretary, and foreign secretary Molotov.

And their last meeting with Adenauer presents the world with a surprise - an agreement to establish normal diplomatic relations between the two countries. Coupled with this is an assurance that German prisoners of war still held in Russia will be sent home in the near future. Both sides appear to regard this outcome as success. The world will wait and see.

As the conference breaks up Western cameramen are surprised to see premier Malenkov, chatting with Adenauer.

News of the agreement is received with mixed feelings in the west. Moscow will become the first capital with both West and East German ambassadors. Adenauer still does not recognize the Eastern regime, but some fear Moscow may provide a base for unofficial talks on German unity and other subjects which London and Washington would rather see discussed in the open. Others welcome agreement between old enemies as an omen of peace. Time will show who is right.
