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BRITAIN ON SHOW IN DENMARK.

You might think Copenhagen was a British town, the way it puts out the flags for the British Trade Exhibition. The Danish capital makes opening day into a gala occasion. Queen Ingrid and King Frederick arrive at the Town Hall for the opening ceremony, and are greeted by the Lord Mayor, the Prime Minister, and British Ambassador Sir Eric Berthoud. Representing the British Government is Mr. Peter Thomsen, President of the Board of Trade.

The Town Hall is packed to hear King Frederick make the opening speech. He honours the occasion by speaking in English.

The formal ceremony over, His Majesty visits the Exhibition itself. Heavy goods are on show in the Forum, and lighter products in the Tivoli Gardens. No formality here; the King and Queen take a lively interest in the brilliant display, of British industrial skill, and have many questions to ask.

A feature of the show is the "Britannia" - a real British pub, built for the occasion.

But it's not all trade and industry - the British Army is here as well, staging a tattoo in the Rosenberg Castle. The Black Watch and the Gordon Highlanders - as usual - very nearly steal the show.

If the kilties stole the show, the royal Signals are determined to steal it back again. As for the Danes - they love them all!
