PULLY COMES HOR.

Antoine Pinay arrives in Paris after walking out of the United Matiens
General Assembly. This bitter blow to U.M. prestige came when the Assembly
decided by 25 votes to 27 to debate the Algerian situation which France
regards as a demostic matter. Pinay and his entire delegation promptly
left the meeting. France's North African troubles grow daily. In Moreoco,
the long-assisted departure of Sultan Ben Arafa finally takes place. The
Sultan, regarded by millions of Moreocoms as a Franch puppet and a spiritual
usurper, leaves his palace for an acrodress near Rabat where a plane waits
to take him into voluntary exile in Tangier. The Franch Resident General
Boyer de le Tour, sees him off.

Don Arafa leaves the government in the hands of a regent, his cousin Moulay Mafid - an obscure primes even the French know little about. No one expects the change to solve saything, for Moroccan nationalists recognise only the exiled Sidi ben Yousseff who was depend by the French two years ago. Since then, two attempts have been made to assassinate the agod Ben Arafa. Will The cousin fare better? The Sultan had hardly started his journey when news came of more bleedshed in various parts of this turbulent French possession.

In Paris grave decisions affecting the future of North Africa, and of the United Nations, face the French cabinet - and fereign ministers Antoine Pinny in particular.
