JEWISH VETERANS.

At the Association of Jewish Ex-Servicemen's remembrance parade, General Sir Gerald Templar G-42-G, is the inspecting officer. He shakes hands with Major Sir J. Brunel Cohen, severely wounded at Ypres in 1917, who is one of the wreath party.

Veterans of the Boer War and of the First World War fall in on Horse Guards Parade side by side with representatives of the 60,000 Jews who fought in the British forces in World War Two. Chief Rabbi Israeli Brodie, conducts the service, after which trumpeters sound the Last Post.

General Templar takes the salute as the parade marches past. These men and women, being both British and Jewish, had a double reason to fight Hitler's threat to the world; and they have a double reason to honour those, Jew and Gentile alike, who died fighting it. The honour of laying the wreath at the Cenotaph goes to Lieutenant David Sharp, B.E.M. late of the Warwickshire Regiment, and Submarine Lieutenant T. Gould, Victoria Cross.
