EXTRACT FROM A RHODESIAN NEWSPAPER.

SPIRIT OF LIVINGSTONE STILL NEEDED IN AFRICA. Livingstone.

At the foot of David Livingstone's statue on the edge of the Victoria Falls today, the Governor-General of the Rhodesian Federation, Lord Llewelin, unveiled a plaque of rededication to Livingstone's ideals.

The unveiling ceremony took place at the second of two services held to commemorate Livingstone's discovery of the Victoria Falls 100 years ago.

Between 2,000 and 3,000 people of all races attended both services. The Plaque unveiled by Lord Llewelin was dedicated by the Archbishop of Central Africa, Dr. Edward Paget.

It records the assembly of men and women of all races, in and from all parts of the Federation, to rededicate themselves and their country to carry on the high Christian aims and ideals which inspired David Livingstone in his mission here.

Earlier Dr. Hubert Wilson, grandson of David Livingstone, unveiled a commemorative plaque. He said:

"You who are here today can carry out the purpose of my grandfather, of setting an example representing to the African what Christianity means."

Final Events.

The services were among the final events of the Livingstone Centenary celebrations which began six months ago. There was a civic luncheon, a banquet and a fireworks display.

The service of commemoration was held round the statue of David Livingstone on the western edge of the Victoria Falls.
