SWANE

The worst disaster they have ever known hits the swans of the Thomas when an edl barge sinks at Batterson. Within a few days, their deedliest enemy - fleating oil - spreads from Rotherhithe to Teddington, and emergency rescue work saves hundreds of birds from a miserable death.

Oil contemination is fatal to water-hirds. Some are dragged down by the cil's weight and drawed, while others try to clean themselves and die through smallowing the edl. So it's crisis stations for the R. S. P. C. A., with every available man bringing the stricken smans in for elecuing.

Fuller's Barth is used to remove the cil coating. Seep or detergent would be useless for this job; it would remove all the natural cil as well, and if the birds tried to swim again, they'd become waterlogged and sink.

These birds will never be really white again - but they'll be alive and well, thanks to the sterling work of the R.S.P.C.A., and other voluntery bedies.
