Ion Matton, the man who has done more for English cricket than anyone since Jack Mobbs, is retiring. At Pudsey, his Yorkshire birthplace, with his wife, Ion tells us how he feels:

You have earned that kindness, Len Hatton. Of all the great achievements of your eareer, we remember most vividly that galden day in 1953 at the Oval, when England under your lendership won back the Ashes for the first time in 20 years.

When Demis Compten made the winning hit, it was your steady work, your brilliant captainty, that had brought us where we were. As the crowd went mad with delight, they all know that on this day leglish cricket has been reborn - and that they had Lem Hutton to thank.

You were England's first professional captain since the early days of cricket; you captained 23 Tests, more than any other Englishman; your wartime injuries would have ended a lesser man's career, but you battled on.
