WAR CANCES.

Wer Cances were used by the Rivers people before 1817 and the last wer in the Rivers took place between 1880 and 1882. For A years, therefore, there has been no reason to maintain war cances in the Rivers and all the war cances fell into rot and disuse. What exist today are far from being the real war cances of the Rivers people.

In the olden days, it cost about £500 to equip one wer cances, and it was not uncommon for one chief to own about six. The royal family of Bonny, for example had 16 wer cances. A wer cances was accompanied by a state gig carrying provisions, spare weapons and assaudtion for reinforcement.

In addition to being held during warfare, war cances in were used during the funeral obsequies of a chief who had a war cances during his lifetime.

A war cance had a capacity of about 35 puncheons of oil, equivalent to about 25 tons, and was therefore capable of carrying not less than 90 paddlers all trained as warriors. Each of these were a black uniform and a traditional turben, and had his rifle strapped over his shoulder and his degger around his waist.

The bottom of the camee was lined with copper sheet and had brass rods extending from the bow to the stern for the purpose of resisting the sheek from the booming cannon, as well as penetration from the bullets of opponents.

The scating position of the mariners was different from that of the peddlers in ordinary gigs. In a war cause, the marines sat with one leg in and the other outside the cause, supported by special straps. This was to render movement easy in an attempt to capture encodes in the case of an attack, or to jump into the unter when necessary during a retreat.

A war camee had one big drum, a mort of a tomtom, and seven hollowed wooden pieces of different mise played by two drumers, the temtom being played by a third drumer. The rhythm of their music was entirely different from that of State Gigs.

The fleet was under the command of an "admiral" and a "vice-admiral" each having a telescope. The admiral gave orders to the bugler according to his observations for the movement of the fleet. There was also a trumpter. A fully equipped war cause had four ordinary cannon and one "machine gum".

STATE CICS.

State gigs were built more for attraction and mobility, and were used on various occasions e.g., during the funeral obsequies of male chiefs, after a victory for purposes of opening new markets and negotiating with other class and for taking chiefs to the factories for traditing purposes. In addition to one or two minor drums, a state gig also had a bell and a xylophone played by two men.

The Riccian Government of the stability of its settlement at Oji River, Itu and Uzuakoli, have a settlement at the Service. Since then the system of control based on several willages assisted by local councils has expanded tremendously.

Today, the Oji River Settlement provides treatment and care of 650-in patients and 8,000 patients in 65 rural centres. In 1947-49, at a peak period, the Settlement served 1,700 in-patients and 12,000 out-patients. Over 25,000 patients receive treatment in the Eastern Region today.

Sulphone drugs brought a new era in leprosy treatment in 1949 - and it is noteworthy that the effective mass-treatment drug - DAPSONE - was the result of research at Usuakoli in the Region. The backbone of this great venture are 150 Africans Leprosy Inspectors in charge of the far-flung segregation villages and rural work. No leprosy patient is smalled enter a Settlement or attend treatment at clinics. They go, because they know that there is a new life within these Settlement of clinics, where they can lead new lives, learn various trades and crafts, or, if young, begin continue their education.

Religion is at the care of the life at these Settlemann and it should be remembered that the Settlemann - Oji River (C.M.S.) Ususkeli (Sethodist) and Itu (Church of Scotland Mission) were all started by the missionary bodies. Itu was founded in 1928 and at one time had about 4,000 patients. Financial assistance comes from the Regional Government and Colonial Developments and Welfare Funds, and drugs from the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund. This great work continues, changing the attitude towards leprosy much be active results.
