GRAND PRIX AT MONACO
Pool coverage (all competition)
Positive UNDEVELOPED: 835 ft- 250 meters

Britain's Stirling Moss, in the lead all the way with his Maserati, yesterday won the 14th Grand Prix of Monaco over the winding streets of the sunny principality. The race was the second test of the year counting toward the 1956 racing-car international championship.

Jean Manuel Fangio, of Argentina, in a Ferrari was second. Moss's official time for 100 times over the 3.145 Kilometer (1.956 mile) course was 3:00:32.9 for an average speed of 104.514 Kms an hour.

Moss and Fangio fought to the last second of the race, with Fangio setting up the best times of the day in the 99th lap with 1:45:3 average 107.522 kms an hour and in the 100th and last lap in 1:44:4, average speed 108.450 kilometers an hour.

Third was Jean Behra of France in a Maserati and fourth Eugenio Castellotti of Italy in a Ferrari.

Six of the 16 starters had dropped out before the race was half over.

After this race Behra, with ten points hold the first place in the international standings, Fangio is second with nine. Moss is now third with eight points for his win of yesterday.
