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NEWS FROM U.S.A.

Strange-looking installations at Runit Island, Eniwetok Atoll, are ready for the testing of a new U.S. atom bomb - equal to perhaps ten thousand tons of T.N.T. First watch the explosion from sea level.

And now from the air.

The mushroom cloud marks a new kind of atomic explosion - smaller but considered five times more effective for its size.

America's first atom-powered submarine, the Nautilus, visits New York, cruising up the bay with the Manhattan skyline as a backcloth. This is her first trip to the city, and she's here to introduce Armed Forces Week. The Nautilus has done 37,000 miles since she was launched - and she's still using her original stock of atomic fuel.

John Landy, Australian holder of the mile record, also seems to have the secret of inexhaustible energy. Here he is trying to beat his own record in the West Coast Relays at Fresno, California. He's leading the field, with Ron Delaney in second place.

A five-mile head wind ruins his chances of a new record - but it can't prevent this incredible Australian from cracking the four-minute mile for the sixth time. A few years ago, experts were asking if it could ever be done; now it's all in the day's work to John Landy!
