

MARSHAL JOSIP BROZ TITO, PRESIDENT OF YUGOSLAVIA

ARRIVES IN MOSCOW

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Moscow,....2nd June, 1956.

Today at the invitation of the Soviet government here arrives on an official visit Marshal Josip Broz Tito, President of the Federative People's Republic of Yugoslavia.

To meet the President, at the Kiev Station arrive leaders of the Communist Party and Government of the Soviet Union, Soviet ministers, marshals, admirals and generals, deputies to the USSR Supreme Soviet, leading personalities from the spheres of culture, science and press. The official welcoming party includes Kliment Voroshilov, Nikolai Bulganin and Nikita Khrushchev.

At 5 p.m., Moscow time, the special train rolls into Kiev Station. Leaders of the Communist Party and the Government of the Soviet Union give the President and his party a warm and cordial welcome. With President Tito and his wife have arrive the Vice-President of the Federative Executive Council, Edvard Kardelj, with his wife, State Secretary of Foreign Affairs Koca Popovich and his wife, and other officials.

Schoolchildren present the guests with flowers.

The Chief of the Guard of Honour makes his report.

Kliment Voroshilov, President of the USSR Supreme Soviet Presidium, delivers a speech of welcome.

A speech in reply is made by President Tito in Russian.

Along the entire route from the Station to the place of his residence Marshal Josip Broz Tito and leaders of the Soviet government and the Communist Party are cheered by hundreds of thousands of Moscovites.
