Kilmarnock welcomes the Queen during her Ayrahire tour, which of course, includes a visit to Robert Burns' cottage at Alloway. The Queen and the Duke spend a quarter of an hour in the poet's birthynce, seene of what some consider his finest pomn "The Cottar's Saturday Night"

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In Minburgh, the royal couple are greated at Prince's Street Station by the Lord Provest, Sir John Banks, who presents Her Majesty with the Keys of the city, and delivers a speech of welcome. She formally returns the keys to the Lord Prevest, before meeting some of Edinburgh's leading personalities.

The Royal Scots Greys provide the Guard of honour.

The Queen and the Duke leave the station for Holyroodhouse. In the Meadows, the Queen attends the Noyal Company of Archers, annual shooting event for the "Edinburgh Arrew" and makes the presentation of the Arrew and the Queen's Prime.

The "Edinburgh Arrow" is won this year by Major J.G.S. Genmall, who receives the coveted trophy from Her Majesty.

The "Queen's Prize" is won by Major A.C. Blair.

In the Palace gardens, the Royal Soots Greys parade to receive a new guiden from Her Hajesty, who is Celenel-in-Chief of the Regiment. On this excasion, only the colour party is mounted. The old guiden a red pannant trimmed with gold, and carrying on both sides, the Regiment's many battle honours - is escerted from the regimental lines and borne selemnly off the parade for the last time.

The oldest battle honours of the Royal Soots Greys - or Second Dragoons, are Blenheim, Ramillies and Oudenarde. The latest, which appear on he new guiden which the Queen is presenting to the Regimental Quartermaster-Sergeant, are El Alamsin, Mofilia, and Salerno.
