

THE QUEEN IN SCOTLAND.

In the forecourt of the Palace of Holyroodhouse, the Queen meets Highland dancers who have been entertaining her and her guests - a pleasant break in the arduous programme of Her Majesty's tour of Scotland.

The following morning, St. Giles' Cathedral is the scene of an ancient ceremony - the installation by the Queen of two new members of the Order of the Thistle. The Royal Company of Archers form the Guard of Honour.

Wearing the robes of the Order, the Queen walks in solemn procession with the members of Scotland's outstanding Order of Chivalry. She is followed by the Duke of Edinburgh. The new members being installed are Sir John Stirling and Lord Mathers.

For the Queen and the Duke's visit to Berwick-on-Tweed, the whole town turns out to give them a welcome. They wave to the crowd from the Town Hall steps.

At the Old Bridge, a 12-pound salmon, caught in the Tweed a few hours before, is presented to Her Majesty by Mr. James Reed, Secretary of Berwick Salmon Fisheries.

To Laneslove House (the seat of the Duke of Hamilton) where the Queen visits the annual show of the United East Lothian Agricultural Society. The entries of a high standard - though some are a little shy.

The Clydesdales make a fine display, and popular as ever are the mare-and-foal entries. And a prize is treasured all the more when a Queen presents it.
