And now it's Court Command just in front of Pont Levis, with Lord Astor's Hornbeen third and Talgo fourth.

Hornbeen and Talgo are closing up on the leaders - it looks as though Pent Levis and Court Command have been wearing each other down just a bit too soon. The favourite's palling on his rein, and jodney Penl Blanc hasn't been able to check him.

Into the straight - still in a bunch - but Pont Levis has lost his lead,

Four furlengs to go - and it might be anybody's race. Court Command is weekening and the favourite is falling back along the rails. But Talgo and Hornbeem are still there. Now it's Talgo in the lead, with Hornbeem and French Beige on his tail.

And here's Combremer making a challenge on the outside. Jockey Fred Palmer's taking him right up smong the leaders! Two furlengs to go!

Pive of them almost mack to mack - but Combromer's pulling away - and Hormboom's battling gamely to stay with him!

Combremer's mastering Hornboom - only a few yards to go, and it looks like yet another French victory - yes, it's Combremer, with Hornboom second and French Beige third.

So Fred Palmer, French-born jockey who won last year's Derby on Phil Drake, adds another English classic to his triumphs - and makes it a hat-trick for France this season. French horses won the Derby, and the Coks, and now the St. Leger. It would be ungenerous not to congratulate them but when are we going to turn the tables?
