The Mid-Ocean Club at Bermuda swaits the leaders of two nations, President Risenhower is on his way to meet Prime Minister MacMillan - a meeting which everyone hopes will heal the breach between Britain and America which srose from the Sues crisis.

The President travels by sea from Morfolk, Virginia.

Over to London Airport, where President Risenhower's old wartime colleague Harold MacMillan is ready for his Westward journey. Before he leaves, he says a word about the purpose of the talks:

"I am leaving tonight for Bermuda, where I shall meet President Risenhower. It is a great pleasure for me to meet him there for two reasons. First, I think it's a great thing that we should have this meeting on British soil, one of the eldest of our British overseas possessions of the Crewa, and relatively, very nice to meet an old friend again.

I've known General Riseshower, may I call him that, President Riseshower, since the days of the war, when I worked at his headquarters as British Resident Minister. We had a lot of very tough problems to deal with them, and we were great friends. And one of the advantages of friendship is that you can talk frankly to your friends, and this is one of the occasions when it's much better that the British should be quite frank about the way they feel, and the Americans I'm sure, will be quite frank about what they feel, too.

But partnership and friendship are based upon frankness and I feel quite confident that a great deal will be gained by this meeting..."

Also at the Premier's Party is Foreign Minister Selmyn Lloyd. No one questions the urgency of healing the Anglo-American rift - for with the world on the brink of another Middle East erisis, Bermuda may held the key to peace. Much depends on the statesmanship of two old friends.....
