CAPTIVE IN A CAVE ?

An imnocent-looking Victorian villa in Lewishem - like hundreds of others in this South London berough. None of the neighbours knew that its back garden hid a strange stery. Pirst inkling that something was amiss came when a next door neighbour found a note pushed through the fence. It claimed that beneath the garden shed of inventer John Bridal, a girl was held captive in a underground room.

The girl, 28-year-old Marjerie Jerdan - seen here at Brighten, trying to ferget it all - alleged in the note that she had been kidnapped by 26-year-old Bridal. Police take the young inventor into his shed to investigate the girl's story. Down this manwhole is the room where Marjorie Jerdan alleges she was kept, against her will, for 105 days. It opens on to a shaft which descends 14 feet to the room of whose existance only Bridal and Marjorie knew. Constructed with great ingennity, it is roughly fitted out as a living room, with electric cooking and electricity, table, chairs, radio, and Marjerie Jordan's bed.

After inspectings the strange room, police photograph the motor-eyels on which Bridal admits he brought Marjorie from her home. "But I didn't kidnep her", he declares as police take him to the station. "You can't on a motor cycle". Except for the first days he said she was there willingly, helping with his inventions. Now the Public Prosecutor is deciding whether to take any action.
