QUEEN MOTHER AT WAR RITE

Positive developed : 132 meters - 443 ft

Queen Mother Elizabeth of Britain dedicated a memorial yesterday in Dunkirk to 4,700 British soldiers, sailors and aviators who died in the battle of Dunkirk 17 years ago.

The Queen Mother, who was accompanied by the Duke of Gloucester came aboard the destroyer *Chieftain*, escorted by four other Royal Navy ships, She was met at the harbor by General Pierre Geneval representing President Rene Coty and a host of other French authorities. Hundreds of British citizens, including many of the veterans of the battle of Dunkirk, came from Britain to witness the ceremony.

Crowds cheered the Queen Mother as she motored through the city to the Hotel de Ville where a reception was held in her honor.

She then reviewed a parade of French troops and detachments of Horse Guards, Grenadier Guards, Scots Guards and members of the Royal Navy, Royal Air Force and Royal Marines. With her was Field Marshal Viscount Montgomery, representatives of the British Commonwealth and Sir Gladwyn Jebb British Ambassador to France.
