PEOPLE IN THE NEWS:

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Twenty-year-old Prince Karin, grandson of the late Aga Khan, is named as Aga Khan IV at the family vills near Geneva. Here, where the relatives gathered, to pay their last respects to the great leader of the Ismaili Moslems, his will was read and they learned his wishes. Many expected one of his some-Aly Khan (with the briefease) or younger brother Sadruddin - to inherit the leader-ship but they were passed over in favour of Aly's son Karim.

The beloved Iman, whose death millions are now mourning was a far-sighted man. The world has changed, he said in his will; and the Imaili community can best be led by a young man who has grown up in this new atomic age.

Sixty-two French visitors arrive at Northolt in planes of the French Air Force, and are welcomed by Air Chief Marshal Sir Romald Ivelaw-Chapman. They are here for two weeks as guests of the R.A.F. Esceping Society, which owes them a great debt; for they and their families all helped the R.A.F. during the war. For example, the husband and son of Madame Tanter were shot for helping British airmen and she herself was a resistance fighter.

The Abbe Blanchebarbe and Mile. Joelle Jeanson lay a wreath at the Cenotaph on behalf of the visitors. Joell's parents gave shelter to esceping airmon; so did the Leonabes, and many of the others. All 62 are staying as guests in private homes; in some cases, the homes of men who ove them their lives.

Mikita Khrushchev, now the undisputed master of the Krumlin, comes to Prague. The Gsech President Zapobecky greets him in turn Continental fashion - and then turns to welcome Bulganin, the Soviet premier. The Gsech capital has erranged a full-scale velcome for the Russian Meeders, who look on top of the world. As Khrushchev tells them: "We had some black sheep in a good flock - and you know how it ended". The Csech Government give whole-hearted approval to the sacking of Malenkov, Melotov, and Kaganovich; but perhaps some of them wonder if they, took are listed as black sheep.

For a man who denounced the cult of personalty, Nikita Khrushchev seems to be doing all right on his own behalf.
