

INTERNATIONAL JAMBOREE:

From 80 countries in all parts of the world come 20,000 Boy Scouts - to the Jamboree at Sutton Coalfields. It's a hundred years since Robert Baden-Powell was born, and fifty years since he held the first experimental camp that marked the foundation of the greatest youth movement the world has ever seen.

Britain's well represented, of course - and foreign contingents range from 1,700 (U.S.A.) to one (El Salvador). The first time they're all on parade together is when they march to the arena for the official opening, which is performed by the Duke of Gloucester, President of the British Boy Scouts' Association.

Incidentally, this is the first time the whole Baden-Powell family - his widow, three children and nine grandchildren - have all been together at the same time. Baden-Powell himself would have been pleased to see German scouts among the rest - sign of a reawakening of those principles of international brotherhood to which Robert Baden-Powell devoted his life.....
