At the tortuous Hurburgring, Germany's elassic racing circuit, Stirling Mess, Peter Collins, and Juan Fangie are among the top drivers racing in the German Grand Prix. Mess and Tony Brooks are in British Vanmalls, Collins and Hawthern in Ferraris, and world champion Fangie in a Maserati. Round the first bend it's Hawthern. Collins, Fangie; but the middle of the third lap finds Fangie in the load.

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Hile by mile the cars are thinning out, and wary soon Fanglo's lepping the field. Then he steps to change rear wheels and refuel. He's built up a meetul lead, but the Ferraris of Hawthorn and Collins can complete the race without refueling - so Fanglo's giving away precieus seconds. Only a man like this incredible Argentinian could hope to overcome such a handicep!

Hawthorne's leading now, and driving magnificently - with Collins on his tail. But Fangle's there too - breaking the lap record time and again - and he takes the lead in the nick of time! He streaks for the line 150 yards ahead of Hawthorn. Experts declare it's Fangle's finest race. Twice the age of his nearest rivals, he's still the world's greatest driver!

The Duke of Minburgh leads his eleven out to field at Arundel Gastle, in a match in aid of the National Playing Fields Association. The other team is captained by the Duke of Norfelk. Prince Fhilip isn't at his best form as a fielder, but when he decides to take over the bowling he despatches four for 60 - including Test player Tem Gravenay. And there aren't too many boundaries. A neat one disposes of the Dake of Norfolk for two. His team's total is 257.
