PEOPLE IN THE NEWS:

Nikita Khrushchev, with Soviet Deputy Premier Mikoyan and Foreign Minister Gromyko, lay a wreath at the Berlin memorial to the Russian soldiers who died in the battle for the German capital. Two things are strange about this East Germany visit. First, Khrushchev is reported to be forcing a degree of liberalisation on the diehard German Stalinists - a novel role for him. And second - where's Bulganin.

The new Aga Khan arrives in Karachi to visit his followers. The 20 million Ismaili Moslems of whom this 20-year-old undergraduate is now the spiritual leader are scattered all over the world - but Pakistan is one of their main centres, and it is here in Karachi that he will be enthroned this December.

A U.S. Senate Committee is probing rackets - and one of the witnesses is Johnny Dio, a convicted embezzler on parole from jail. He dodges questions by invoking his constitutional rights - and once he's outside, he seems to think one of his rights is the right not to be photographed.

Watch closely and you'll see Johnny Dio along a photographer.
