Princess Margaret walks in the garden of the Governor's House in Port of Spain with the Governor-General, Lord Hailes. The Princess's popularity with the people of the new West Indian Federation is higher than ever, and they keep her programme full from morning till night; but the Princess enjoys every moment of it. Huge crowds watch her drive to Woodford Square - Port of Spain's equivalent of Hyde Park Corner - to lay the foundation stone of a new Town Hall. Civic pride runs high in the young Federation, and new public buildings are likely to be a prominent feature of the next few years.

A few miles inland from Port of Spain, the Princess visits Trinidad's Imperial College of Tropical Agriculture, where she learns the inside secrets of the cocoa pod.

The Princess visits Tobago, the Robinson Crusoe island for a three-day rest - but she still finds time to visit the local hospital and talk informally with the medical staff and the patients - particularly the young ones.

Back to Trinidad for the West Indian Arts Festival - for song and dance can never stay out of any West Indian programme for long.

Federal Prime Minister Sir Grantley Adams sits with the Princess, to explain anything she may not understand. But she's becoming a connoisseur of West Indian music in her own right.
