Into the final straight - and now it's Seleucus in the lead, but he's being strongly challenged by Garibaldi - but now Sendiacre's coming through! He's left Garibaldi behind and he's passing Seleucus!

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Yes, it's Sandiacre, that Northern six-year-old - Seleucus second - Garibaldi's challenge has failed, and he's struck at third as they pass the post! Sandiacre lay fifth until the last two furlengs, so that was no easy win - just a remarkable effort by a real stayer. You get 100 to 7 for your money - or did you!

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
