R.A.C. "AERIAL PATROL" WILL SPOT CONGESTIONS MAJOR EXPERIMENT ON BANK HOLIDAY HIGHWAYS

In the biggest experiment of its kind, the R.A.C. will be making an aerial survey of the main "Holiday Highways" in South-East England on August Bank Holiday Monday. The chief object of the Club's "Aerial Patrol" will be to assess the principal congestion spots along the main traffic arteries and, it is hoped, help to eliminate bottlenecks.

The R.A.C. successfully pioneered the use of aircraft in easing traffic congestion many years ago. Its helicopters have proved of inestimable value in helping to control the crowds that line the route on the Club's annual London - Brighton Run for Veteran Cars.

If the weather is favourable, the R.A.C. expects a record number of more than six million cars and motor-cycles to be using Britain's roads over the August holiday period.

The R.A.C. has erected more than 2,000 signs throughout the country to provide alternative routes avoiding notorious 'bottlenecks', besides signposting the way to sporting events of every type in all parts of the United Kingdom.

All leave has been cancelled for the Club's Road Patrols who will cover more than 150,000 miles to provide road-users with information, advice and assistance.

Also on duty will be the attractive "girls-in-blue", the R.A.C.'s corps of Patrolettes, who have swiftly captured the imagination of the motoring public since their introduction last year. Additionally, the Club's Mobile Offices will be functioning at strategic sites round the coasts and seaside resorts and at inland beauty spots to "Bring Service to the Member".

The Touring Department of the Club is now receiving requests at the rate of nearly 1,000 a day from motorists and motor-cyclists for itineraries to different parts of the British Isles. Applications for foreign tours are 40 per cent higher than last year.

At home, motorists will be protected against breakdowns and other trouble on the roads by the R.A.C.'s Radio Rescue Service operating in London, Birmingham and Manchester areas and by the Club's "Get-You-Home" Service, operated through some 7,000 specially-appointed garages and agents, which annually comes to the aid of nearly 200,000 luckless travellers.

These emergency Services will be manned day-and-night, all-round-the-clock.
