## 100 CARAVANS MUST QUIT.

Caravanars had barricaded one entrance to the sight when Pathe News investigated the situation near Egham, Surrey. It is an unlicensed sight and the Council has given dwellers in nearby 100 caravans notice to quit. It's a stark problem; where can they ge? There's running water on the site and tradesmen call, but sanitation is below Council requirements. Altogether the families have more than 100 children. Pathe Interviewer Bill Symon heard several heart rending stories.

Nost of them knew they had no legal right to be there.

Across the road from the sight Council house dwellers gave their views. Most of them appreciated the caravaners' problem.

Someone had overturned a car to obstruct any Baillifs who might call. But this is a Green Belt area, whose regulations the Law must sufforce. Caravaners who'd found somewhere to go were already on the move. One or two had taken lodgings and were going to store their caravans. The same problem has occured elsewhere in the country and the difficulties at Eghan may not be the last. To people who cannot afford to buy houses and can't rent them, caravans often seem to meet the case. It's tough when the Law intervenes.
