JOHN ASHLEY

In 1835 the Rev. Dr. John Ashley was looking out at the becalmed sailing vessels in the Bristol Channel and was asked by his small son how the men on board could get to Church. This question led him to resign an important benefice and to devote the remainder of his working life to a ministry to seafarers. His pioneer efforts led to the co-ordination of other similar localised efforts and to the founding in 1856 of The Missions to Seamen.

M.V. "JOHN ASHLEY"

For the last seven years a small Admiralty fishing vessel on loan to The Missions to Seamen and converted into a floating Church and club has been ministering to the men of colliers and coasters in the Thames and Medway. She has logged some 6,500 miles each year and welcomed over 17,000 men aboard annually, being to them a cinema, a television room, a shop, a library, a haven and refuge from the dirt and monotony of the ships and in time of need an ambulance, an errand boy, a hospital. Last year it became clear that this vessel, never intended for her present work, was too small and too old and the new "John Ashley" was ordered.

THE COST

The new vessel will cost £31,000. £22,500 of this sum has already been subscribed by various companies and private friends of The Missions to Seamen, including a donation of £9,000 from the Calcuste-Gulbenkian Foundation. The raising of the remaining £8,500 is a matter of urgent concern but is being facilitated by the most generous offer of an anonymous donor to match pound for pound any donations received by the Society towards this outstanding sum.
