STORY : THE DUKE VISITS BHAKRA DAM

LOCATION: NANGAL, BHAKRA & CHANDIGARH 25th January 59

PLUS X 530. DAYLIGHT

Nehru once said that Bhakra is more and more becoming a word for power and prosperity. Bhakra Dam is something tremendous something stupendous and something which shakes you up when you see it. It is the symbol of India's Progress."

The Bhakra Dam spells some of the greatest engineering feats. The stage has been reached after constructing two of the largest river diversion tunnels in the world, the highest rolled filled dam in India, removal of 7.4 million cubic yards of earth and rock excavation, the longest belt conveyor system in Asia and one of the most modern concrete production factories in the world.

At present the potential wealth of the flood waters of river Sutlej runs waste to sea. The completion of the Bhakra will harness this asset by the creation of fifty five mile long lake impounding 74,00,000 agre feet of water. Out of this 57,30,000 agre feet will be available for irrigation and generation of power every year. The dam costing 650 million rupees (Rs.13 equal to one pound sterling) is being constructed as a straight gravity structure of cement concrete, rising 740 feet above the lowest foundation and spanning the gorge with its 1700 feet at the top. At the base it will have 1300 feet including the spillway apron and the upstream claystone plug.

Preparation for the construction of Bhakra Dam started an a full scale for the first time in 1948.

The Duke spent three hours visiting Bhakra and was visibly impressed by all he saw. He talked to the workers and showed keen interest in the construction of this great project which in terms of Mr. Nehru is a modern Indian temple.

Arriving by train from Delhi, the Duke was received at Nangal station by the Governor of Punjab Mr. Gadgil. Several ministers of the Punjab Government were present at the platform and each one of them garlanded the Duke when he shook hands with them. On both sides of the road leading to Bhakra managementings large crowds of people were standing to greet the Duke.

After visiting Nangal where arriver has been diverted the Duke arrived at the site of the Bhakra Dam and was received by Mrxxatixxx Mr. Slocum, the American Dam Expert who has been advising on the construction of the dam. Mr. Slocum was the chief guide and he explained about the construction to the Duke. Later the Duke drove upto the top of the Dam where he

spent nearly one hour looking at the dam.

From Bhakra Duke drove to Chandigarh the newsest town in India designed by Le Corbusier, the Frech genius. Large crowds dashed forward and broke the police cordon when the Duke's car arrived there. The Duke waved from the car and people cheered as the car drove away.

STORY : INDIA CELEBRATES REPUBLIC DAY.

LOCATION: NEW DELHI JANUARY 26th ,59

PLUS X 700 EXTERIORS.

India is a colourful land of festivals. Most of the festivals are centuries old and are celebrated year by year. To these list of festivals, a new one was added nine years ago when India became a republic and for the celebration of this festival, which comes every year on the 26th of January, millions rejoice all over India. The Armed Forces Parade and the Cultural Pageant attracts several thousand people to Delhi to witness this great national festival.

The President of India, Dr. Rajendra Prasad, who is also the Supreme Commander of India's Armed Forces drove in state from Rashtrapati Bhavan (President's House) escorted by his colourful mounted body guards. On arrival at the saluting base, the President was received by Mr. Nehru.

One of the highlights of the parade this year was the presence of the Duke of Edinburgh. The anxiety of the mamoth crowd to see the Duke was so great that Mr. Nehru requested the Duke to join him in a jeep and go round the entire area where nearly half a million people had concentrated. The crowd cheered as the jeep in which the Duke & Mr. Nehru were standing and in reply the Duke waved to the general public.

The Parade started with the arrival of the Armoured Corps which was followed by the marching infantry. Thousands of School children carrying banners in their hands presented and marching in front of the President of India, presented a spectacular site.

Marching elephants led the Pageantry procession in which several fixtx representing various states of India moved past the general public. Folk Dancers from all parts of India dressed in their attires also marched in the procession. Fly past by the Air Force marked the grand finale to the great festival which takes nearly 3 months of preparations and rehearsals etc.
