

ENGLAND BEAT SCOTLAND.

Scotland's captain, Bobby Evans started another attack, passing to Bobby Collins. The inside right sent the ball to Docherty and that excellent right-half made ground towards the English goal area. It splot danger, and as the ball came in from the right, Hopkinson fumbled. Hard's shot was deflected. Inside left John Dick put the ball to Willie Ormond. This time Hopkinson saved brilliantly.

From now on England mostly had the ball in the Scottish half. Much brilliant approach work was at last rewarded. Over on the right Brian Douglas centred. Charlton was there with a lovely header. It bounced in.

It was the only goal of the match. Bill Brown's great goalkeeping was one reason; England's poor finishing was another. Brown saved again, from Charlton this time. England well deserved to win.
