It's being built in Rome for the Olympic Games, and Italians from all over the country, even student-priests, are already getting excited at the prospect. The Eternal City will be a worthy host to the world's athletes. Smaller, but still empiressive, will be the swimming stadium, where it's reasonable to hope that a gold medal or two will come the way of Britain. However, that's looking ahead. The Queen Nother, on holiday in Rome, went to the Villa Borghese to unveil a statue of Lord Myron. Her Majesty said that culture is one of the enduring links between civilized peoples. In his lifetime, Hyron's works were translated into Italian and widely whad. "Oh Rome, my country, City of the soul", is inscribed on the plinth. The statue is a copy of the famous one by Thorwaldson, now at Trinity College, Cambridge. Here in Rome it is a gracious tribute by Italy to a great English poet.
