THE GUILDHALL AT PORTSMOUTH ON MONDAY, 8TH JUNE, 1959.

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My Lord Mayor,

It is always a pleasure to my husband and me to come to Portsmouth and I thank you for the loyal and affectionate Address with which you have received us and for the warmth of the welcome which you and the citizens of Portsmouth have given us.

From the earliest days the story of Portsmouth has been linked with the sea; it is still the scene of many important naval occasions. The old tradition of service continues, and I am happy to know that the great dockyard of this city has a full programme of work.

When my father and mother visited Portsmouth in 1941 your Guildhall, which my grandfather had opened, had been in ruins for less than a month. I am glad today to continue that deep interest which my family have always taken in your affairs by coming here to see this fine building that has risen from those ruins. In these splendid surroundings you will receive visitors from all parts of the Commonwealth, and, indeed, from all parts of the world. [ I congratulate all who took part in its planning and its construction. My husband and I know how much it means to you and we wish success to you and the citizens of Portsmouth in all their future endeavours.

SPEECH TO BE MADE BY THE QUEEN WHEN HER MAJESTY  
PRESENTS THE QUEEN'S COLOUR TO THE SUBMARINE COMMAND  
IN H.M.S. DOLPHIN AT GOSPORT ON MONDAY 8TH JUNE, 1959.

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Admiral Taylor, Captain Napier, Officers and men of the  
Submarine Command and H.M.S. Dolphin,

I am delighted to see here today so many of you,  
both serving and retired, together with members of the Royal  
Canadian Navy serving in submarines of the Royal Navy.

Ever since the first Holland boat entered service  
with the Royal Navy in 1902 the contribution of submarines  
to our naval power has steadily grown in importance. They  
soon made their mark in the first world war by gallant  
exploits in the North Sea and in the Mediterranean, notably  
in the Dardanelles where their crews earned undying fame.  
In the second world war their contribution to victory was  
great indeed, particularly since the submarine service, in  
ships and men, was only a small proportion of the Navy's  
strength.

A submarine, perhaps more than any other type of  
ship, depends for its effectiveness and safety on the  
personal skill and devotion of every member of its Ship's  
Company. It works alone far from friendly help and must  
rely for long periods entirely on the resourcefulness of its  
crew. It is perhaps for this reason that the annals of the  
British submarines contain so many instances of individual  
courage, skill and endurance in the highest traditions of  
the Royal Navy.

The striking power and versatility of submarines will increase beyond all recognition with the advent of nuclear engines and guided missiles. The nuclear submarine may well become the capital ship round which the Navy of the future will be built. Next Friday my husband will open a new chapter in the long history of the Royal Navy when he lays the keel of our first nuclear submarine, the Dreadnought.

Whatever shape the Navy may take, however, its greatness will always be governed by the quality of the officers and men who serve in it.

I give you this Colour today therefore in memory of the splendid achievements of the submarine service in the past and in recognition of the vital part which you and your successors will play in the defensive strength of this country and the future of the Royal Navy. I am confident that it will inspire you to emulate the high example of your predecessors.

We have not forgotten the sympathy displayed by King George VI and the Queen Mother when they personally visited the City during the aerial attacks of 1941. And we vividly remember the lovely May morning in 1947 when Portsmouth was privileged to welcome the King and Queen back to the United Kingdom from their visit to South Africa on which Your Majesty and Princess Margaret had accompanied them. We feel confident that the forthcoming visit of Your Majesty and Prince Philip to Canada will further cement the bond of unity which holds Your Peoples in close harmony, and we pray that your visit may be blessed with health and happiness and with a safe return.

It was on the 10th January, 1941 that this building was destroyed by enemy action and the rebuilding of it commenced in 1955 and is now completed. We feel that the skill of Mr. Berry Webber the Architect, and the technique and experience of Messrs. Gee, Walker and Slater have produced a building which will please Your Majesty and of which this City will be proud.

I have the honour to invite Your Majesty graciously to declare the Guildhall open.

WORDING ON COMMEMORATIVE PLAQUE  
TO BE UNVEILED BY HER MAJESTY  
AT GUILDHALL, PORTSMOUTH.

The foundation stone of the original building was laid on the 14th August, 1886, by the Mayor (Alderman A.S. Blake) and the building was opened on the 9th August, 1890, by Their Royal Highnesses The Prince and Princess of Wales.

It was destroyed by enemy action on the night of the 10th-11th January, 1941, and the work of reconstruction commenced on the 23rd April, 1955.

The Guildhall was opened by HER MAJESTY QUEEN ELIZABETH II accompanied by HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE PHILIP, DUKE OF EDINBURGH, on the 8th day of June, 1959.

ADMIRALTY NEWS RELEASE (Issued 28th May)QUEEN TO PRESENT HER COLOUR TO SUBMARINE COMMAND

H.M. the Queen, accompanied by H.R.H. the Duke of Edinburgh, is to present the first Queen's Colour to H.M.S. DOLPHIN for the Submarine Command of the Royal Navy, at Gosport (Hants.) on Monday, 8th June.

The Royal Guard, paraded for the ceremony on the playing field of the establishment, which has been used by submariners since the earliest history of their craft, will be made up of ratings from submarine squadrons on duty in British, Australian and Canadian waters.

Watching the ceremony and afterwards presented to the Queen will be eight Victoria Cross holders who gained their awards for service in the 58-year-old submarine branch. The widows of two officers posthumously awarded the V.C. in the last war, will also be there.

The visit of the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh to H.M.S. Dolphin, headquarters of the Submarine Command, follows their engagements in Portsmouth earlier in the day and they cross the harbour from H.M.S. VERNON, the Portsmouth torpedo and anti-submarine school, to Gosport by Royal Barge.

The Royal Standard will be broken in DOLPHIN when they arrive at the main pier at 3.20 p.m. to be received by the First Lord of the Admiralty, the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Selkirk, O.B.E., A.F.C. Among the officers presented to them will be the Secretary of the Admiralty (Sir John Lang, G.C.B.), the Fourth Sea Lord (Rear Admiral N.A. Copeman, C.B., D.S.C.) and the Flag Officer, Submarines (Rear Admiral B.W. Taylor, D.S.C.). The Queen and the Duke drive to the playing field for the ceremony along a route lined by officers and ratings from DOLPHIN and the Royal Naval Hospital, Haslar, with special places reserved for children from Alverstoke and Gosport schools.

At the Parade, the Queen and the Duke will be met by the Flag Officer, Submarines, and also the Captain of the 5th Submarine Squadron (Captain L.W. Napier, D.S.O., D.S.C., R.N.), which is based on DOLPHIN. There will be a Royal Salute before the Queen inspects the Royal Guard of one hundred men from submarine squadrons operating from DOLPHIN, Malta, Faslane, Sydney and Halifax and with the Home Fleet. The Parade Commander will be Commander R.W. Garson, R.N., of H.M.S. DOLPHIN.

For the formal consecration of the new Queen's Colour, platoons of ratings from submarine squadrons of home waters and H.M.S. ST. VINCENT, Boys Training Establishment at Gosport, and the Royal Guard, form a hollow square about piled drums for a service conducted by the Chaplain of the Fleet, (the Venerable Archdeacon F.D. Bunt, C.B., O.B.E., R.N.) and the Principal Chaplain of the Church of Scotland and Free Churches (the Rev. H.J.N. Purves, O.B.E., R.N.).

After the consecration service, the Colour Lieutenant-Commander (Lieutenant-Commander M.T. Hickie, D.S.C, R.N.) will give the Colour - a silk White Ensign with the Crown and Royal Cipher in the centre; red, white and blue silk cord and gold tassels - to the Queen, who hands it to the Colour Officer (Lieutenant N.W.C. Kennedy, R.N.).

The Queen is then to address the Parade and a reply will be made by the Flag Officer, Submarines, before a march past the Queen and the Duke on the saluting dais.

At the conclusion of the ceremony, a number of presentations will be made to the Queen, who will also inspect a platoon of 48 members of the Submarine Old Comrades Association under Vice-Admiral Sir Sydney M. Raw, K.B.E., C.B., a former Flag Officer, Submarines, before she leaves for the

**Wardroom.**

Eight holders of the Victoria Cross will be present at the reception held in the Wardroom. Among them will be Commander N.D. Holbrook, Rear Admiral E.C. Boyle and Admiral Sir Martin Dunbar-Nasmith, who received the award for operations as Lieutenants in the first World War for operations in the Sea of Marmora. Present also will be Mrs. Wanklyn, widow of the late Lieutenant-Commander M.D. Wanklyn, V.C., D.S.O. and Bar, R.N., and Mrs. Linton, widow of the late Commander J.W. Linton, V.C., D.S.O., D.S.C., R.N.

The Queen leaves H.M.S. DOLPHIN to return to Portsmouth at about 4.40 p.m.

H. M. S. D O L P H I N1. General

H.M.S. DOLPHIN (Fort Blockhouse) has been the Headquarters of the Royal Navy's submarine branch since 1904. It is the flagship of Flag Officer, Submarines and also the submarine training depot. Since the last war the facilities at H.M.S. DOLPHIN have been extensively modernised in a programme which is still continuing. New buildings include the 100 ft. escape training tank, a new periscope workshop and five new accommodation and amenities blocks for Chief Petty Officers and Petty Officers.

Junior Ratings accommodation has been thoroughly modernised and the Officers' blocks are in process of modernisation.

The Route

The route from the Pierhead to the Parade Ground (Haslar Playing Fields) is lined by Naval Officers and ratings from H.M.S. DOLPHIN and the neighbouring Royal Naval Hospital, Haslar.

On the seaward side are school children from Gosport and Alverstoke.

Personnel on Parade

(a) The Royal Guard

The Royal Guard of 100 men is composed of ratings drawn from all Royal Naval submarine squadrons. These are the First Squadron based at Malta, the Second Squadron with the Home Fleet, the Third Squadron based Faslane on the Clyde, the Fourth Squadron at Sydney, Australia, the Fifth Squadron at H.M.S. DOLPHIN and the Sixth Squadron based at Halifax, Canada. The Guard includes Canadian ratings who are serving in submarines of the Royal Navy.

(b) Unarmed Platoons

Ten unarmed platoons will be on parade. Five of these platoons are composed of submarine ratings serving in Home waters, and five of junior seamen from the training establishment H.M.S. ST. VINCENT. Thus the submariners of the future can also be said to be represented.

(c) Old Comrades
