

PRESIDENT FLIES HOME.

Mr. Eisenhower's historic visit to Europe ended at Prestwick Airport. In eleven days he went to West Germany and France, as well as Britain. Arriving in Washington less than nine hours after leaving Prestwick he said he was convinced that the peoples of the western world had a deep affection for each other and trust and economic strength.

At Culzean Castle, on the Ayrshire coast, the President spent a week-end of relaxation, if not complete rest. The Marquis of Ailsa welcomed him there. Culzean belongs to the National Trust for Scotland. Six years ago the top flat of the Castle was put at Mr. Eisenhower's disposal.

Nearby Turnberry Golf Club the President had determined to visit before he went home, and this was his one opportunity.

Something he hadn't tried before was sampled in the few remaining hours in Scotland, transport by governess cart. They take life at a leisurely pace hereabouts.

Three miles from Culzean, the President attended morning service at Kirkoswald. Soon, it was time to bid Britain farewell, as far as in him lay, Mr. Eisenhower had accomplished his mission, striving hard as ever in the cause of peace. The Western World says, Thank you, Mr. President.
