

IKE AND K. TALK IT OVER.

Nikita Khrushchev is home, to the biggest welcome even Moscow has ever seen. And what does he tell the Russians about Ike? He praises his "statesmanship, wisdom, courage and valour" - and says he's convinced America wholeheartedly supports its President in wanting to end the Cold War.

Back to the States for a look at the last hours of that memorable visit. The two leaders walk across the White House lawn to the Presidential helicopter which is to carry them to the depths of the country, near Ike's farm at Gettysburg, where they can escape the crowds and the cameras and the trick questions and get down to brass tacks, man to man. Which is the main point of the visit, as America, Russia and all the world see it.

Here's the spot - Camp David. The cameramen are allowed all the briefest of shots - because from now on, hours are precious in what may turn out to be one of the most important conversations in history. But the world is naturally and intensely curious about these two - ready to read hope into a smile, confidence, into a gesture. And by all the signs - things are going well.
