KHRUSHCHEV IN U.S.A.

TO CAMP DAVID

After a ten day whirlwind tour, Soviet Premier Khrushchev followed his host across the White House Lawn to a waiting helicopter for the trip to Camp David, Maryland.

CAMP DAVID - TALKS BEGIN

President Eisenhower and Premier Khrushchev arrive at Camp David after a thirty-five minute helicopter flight from the White House.

In a jovial mood, the President and the Premier pose outside Aspen Lodge where their serious negotiations are scheduled through the weekend.

WASHINGTON - KHRUSHCHEV HOLDS FINAL NEWS CONFERENCE

Just back from talks with President Eisenhower at Camp David, Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev enters the National Press Club in Washington to hold his final news conference of his stay in the U.S. He has this to say:

K. INTERPRETER (APPROX 30F) "We had pleasant talks.. all subjects.. great deal in common in points and relations between...(our two countries.)"

OVERALL CROWD Though both sides in the discussion remained steadfast in their positions, Khrushchev had this to say about prospects for peace:

K. INTERPRETER "I always held..peace assured after meeting with President hopes further.. he wants... peace.. as we do."

OVERALL Then Khrushchev was questioned about the young people who were seen going to church by observers during the trip to Russia of Vice President Nixon. Khrushchev explains that young people in Russia go to church out of curiosity.

K & INTERPRETER "This is partly explained by feeling of curiosity.. many of the young people hear about religion.. God..church.. ceremony if only go once.. Churches never close."

WASHINGTON - EISENHOWER BIDS GOOD-BYE TO KHRUSHCHEV

Escorting Premier Khrushchev up the steps of Blair House, President Eisenhower wishes the Premier a pleasant and safe voyage home. Both men appear in good spirits after discussing such problems as Berlin and disarmament. A warm handshake seals what might be the beginning of a new era of friendlier relations between America and the Soviet Union. The President also shakes hands with Foreign Minister Gromyko, Soviet Ambassador Menshikov and other members of the Russian delegation. The Russian chief waves goodbye until their next meeting.
