

INDIA LIKES HIM.

Nowhere on his great tour of the Free World has President Eisenhower been more warmly received than in India. Delhi University was typical. Everybody there made it a personal business to leave him in no doubt that another vast country had taken him to its heart.

Premier Nehru was there when the University conferred on Mr. Eisenhower the degree of Doctor of Laws. As he said himself it was the tribute of the world's largest democracy, India, to the Head of the second largest, the United States. And while India has refused to be drawn into any alliance against the Communist world, her people have left it in no doubt that they are on the side of freedom. The degree was a formal expression of what the nation felt.

It is too early yet to estimate the full value of the President's tour; but surely not too early to say that he has, by sincerity and friendship, drawn closer together the wide-spread millions who have a common faith in the democratic way of life.
