

TWO FACES OF FREEDOM.

At Lancaster House met the Conference which will discuss the Kenya Constitution. The Colonial Secretary, Mr. Iain MacLeod, opened the proceedings. Sheik Mackawi represents the Arab Constituency. Michael Blundell speaks for Europeans of the New Kenya Party. Regret was expressed, by both the Colonial Secretary, and his colleague the new Governor of Kenya, Sir Patrick Reardon, that the elected African members were boycotting the Conference. The 14 empty places of course included Tom Mboya's. Next day a compromise was reached and the Africans agreed to attend.

Many thousand Jews and Gentiles marched from Marble Arch to the German Embassy, in silent protest against the resurgence of anti-semitism in Germany. Prominent non-Jewish marchers included Dr. Donald Soper. The organisers claimed that the demonstrators numbered as many as 50,000.

In Belgrave Square, where the Germany Embassy is situated, the marchers were joined by the Bishop of Southwark, Dr. Stockwood. There, too, was a woman, Mrs. Claudette Kennedy, in the blue and grey striped dress she wore when a prisoner at Auschwitz.
