A spectacular show of volcanic activity erupts on the island of Hawaii for the second time in a little over two months. This time the lava is spouting from a line of volcances a mile and a half ling, and a village gets set to evacuate as the sea of fire approaches. The fall of volcanic ash is also a hazard to people in the vicinity. A volcano in your back yard is the unwanted scenic attraction of residents in the village of Kapoho. Small brush fires are started and hundreds of acres of sugar cane are covered by lava, but the village appears temporarlily out of danger as the flow of molten rock reaches the sea, throwing up dense clouds of smoke and steam. Once again, the 50th State gives us a memorable picture.
