NEW HOUR OF RIOTING IN TOKYO

A snake dance through the streets of Tokyo signals new pressure against the U.S. - Japanese defense treaty. Students, socialists and left-wing workers in front of the American Embassy protest President Eisenhower's scheduled visit. The demonstration moves to the residence of Premier Nobusuke Kishi, whose resignation is demanded. The emotional crowd even pulls open the locked steel gates that guard the estate. Tugging at rope tied to the gate, the rioters gain a short-lived victory. But the police react quickly. Order is restored, though the atmosphere remains uneasy.
