PRESENTATION AND ENTHRONEMENT OF FIRST
ARCHBISHOP OF EAST AFRICA

The Right Reverend Leonard Beecher, 54 year-old Bishop of MOMBASA, yesterday became the first Archbishop of the new Anglican Province of East Africa, which was inaugurated by the Archbishop of Canterbury earlier in the day. The Service of Presentation of the new Archbishop took place at the Collegiate Church of St. Alban the Martyr, Dar es Salaam, witnessed by a congregation of several hundred including His Excellency the Governor of Tanganyika, Sir Richard Turnbull, and Lady Turnbull.

Vows of obedience to the Archbishop, of East Africa were made by the clergy and the laity, and after a blessing by the Archbishop of Canterbury the enthronement took place, followed by the presentation of the Primatial Cross.

In his sermon Dr. Fisher welcomed the first Archbishop of East Africa and spoke of the profound and searching challenge confronting the new Province. "Now self-government," Dr. Fisher said. "Let them take warning from Europe. Self-government, whether for a nation or for an individual, is not salvation. Self-government casts leaders and people into all the turbulent temptations...."

The Dioceses in the new Province came from different ecclesiastical traditions, in some respects confusing and contradictory, Dr. Fisher warned. "That is the fault of the Church of England. That it sent out missionaries to Tanganyika and Kenya is to its eternal credit; that it sent them out with discordant methods of teaching and worship is to its shame. I am thankful to say that the Church of England is now learning how to resolve some of its own discords in a true harmony..."

"With all my heart", Dr. Fisher concluded, "I send this province forth under its own Archbishop." The Blessing at the end of the service was given by the Archbishop of East Africa, the Most Reverend Leonard Beecher.

The Archbishop of East Africa, formerly the Bishop of Mombasa, took a degree in science at Imperial College and London Day Training College, University of London, and went to Kenya in 1927 as an assistant master at the Alliance High School, Kikuyu. He was ordained in 1929, becoming Principal of Kahuhia Central School in the Kikuyu Reserve under the Church Missionary Society a year later. He was appointed Archdeacon of Mombasa in 1945, was consecrated Assistant Bishop in 1950 and became Bishop of Mombasa in 1953.

He is well known for his literary and linguistic gifts. He published a Kikuyu-English dictionary in 1933 and took a leading part in translating the Old Testament into Kikuyu,

- 56 to 60 The crowd has a close view of the aircraft which brought the Archbishop.

- 61 to 65 A section of the 500 people who attended the garden party which included bishops, clergy, school teachers, other missionaries with their wives and children.
- 66 to 80 From left to right are:- Bishop Omari, Mrs. Omari, Mrs. Stanway, Mrs. Fisher, Bishop Stanway, Dr. Fisher and others pose to the cameraman.
- 81 to 85 A queue awaiting their turn to greet the Archbishop at the garden party.
- 86 to 94 Padre Elia Boma informs the Archbishop of his experiences during World War II in Palestine, Libya and Egypt.

- 6 to 15 The procession starts from the Provost's house which included Acolytes, Ministers of other Christian Churches, the Clergy, the Headmaster of St. Andrew's College Minski and the Provost leading the procession.

- 11 to 25 Procession of Bishops starts headed by the Cross Bearer and Acolytes, the Registrars and Chancellors, Visiting Bishops, the Assistant Bishops of East Africa, the Diocesan Bishops of East Africa, the Lord Archbishop of East Africa, a Chaplain carrying the Primatial Cross, the Deacons of Honour and the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury.
- 26 to 40 Procession enters the church - Close-up picture of the Lord Archbishop of East Africa, James Beecher, and the Archbishop of Canterbury singing a verse of hymn "All people that on earth do dwell....."
- 41 to 100 Inside the Church
- The Lord Archbishop of Canterbury is seated before the Altar.
- The Lord Archbishop of Canterbury stands together with the Lord Archbishop of East Africa before the Altar while the Bishops of East Africa present their new Archbishop to the Archbishop of Canterbury.
- The Archbishop of Canterbury takes the right hand of the Archbishop of East AFRICA AND PLACES HIM ON THE THRONE, presenting him with the Primatial Cross.
