Horse Guards Parade was in RAF hands, 20th anniversary of the Battle of Britain; and the man who in 1940 led Fighter Command and beat off the greatest threat since 1066, Air Chief Marshal Lord Dewding, had a host of memories, as he saw Spitfires and Hurricane. For it was the Spits and Hurries that flung the Germans back, and turned our darkest hours into bright hepe. The mock operations room looks like the real thing of twenty years ago, plotting the enemy bombers and alerting our squadrens. The Battle of Britain destreyed Hitler's invasion chance.

But, as the Doedle Bug at the Bomb Dispenal Display reminds us, Britain took a lot of punishment, for long after 1940. The V.2. Rockets were Germany's last fling, and terrible havoe they wrought. Some of the thousands of enemy bombs that didn't go aff have kept the Bomb Dispenal Units busy over since. So, outside Hersham, one Unit was at home to the public, telling the visitors how the dud bombs are located and made harmless. Divers deal with them if they're under water. Explained too, was the precedure for reaching bombs ddep down.

Quite a collection. What a mercy they didn't go off.
