- LOADING: The fish are loaded into special containers under the wings of a plane which will take them to their destination... the streams and lakes of New Zealand. Strange but true... the tiny trout ~~rain~~ fall from the skies into their new home. These are real flying fish. And does the air-drop hurt them N^ot a bit of it. It won't be long before they're big fellows, luring anglers from all parts of New Zealand. Trout to provide sport and food... or to provide eggs to re-stock the lakes and streams for another season. This fellow's a beauty, and today, there are tens of thousands more like him...
