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FRANCE HIT BY FLOODS
35 mm. developed positive : 66 meters - 220 ft

Two days of heavy continuous rains have sent the usually calm rivers of south-central France on a rampage that has washed out reads, railreads, flooded teams and killed at leats eight persons. Lecal efficials said the floods were the worst in 59 and perhaps fifty years. Thousands were temperarily homeless as flood waters covered some teams under more than six foot of water and inflicted millions of france worth of damage on homes and industries. Thousands of people, families received official warning to flee from their homes and billages in the Crouse Valley.

Departmental authorities warned that cracks had appeared in the CHANTEGRELLE dam near Aubussen. The rain swellen lake surging behind the dam poised a waters threat to the valley below. Happily to this day the Dam has not broken, and it is now announced that waters are receiding. Should it not rain for several days, danger will be less.

Our special helicepter has flown over the flooded countryside between the Creme valley (chowing the Chambegrelle dam with its breach on the left side of the dam), to the term of AUBUSSON, which is now begining digging out of several foot of mud after the water began receiding.

Worst hit here were the terms of Brive and Tulle, about 500 miles southwest of Paris, on the Correse river along the western slepes of the Massif Central. Thousands of persons had to be evacuated.

A total of more than 6,000 residents were evacuated of eight villages from the valley below the Chantegrelle Dam.

At Aubussenb (shown on our report) all business and industries of the town have been damaged. It is expected that it will take several days to clear away enough of the mid and debis to permit work to start again. Abussen is famous for its Carpet and tagistry industries.
