Sotheby's chairman Peter Wilson conducted another record picture sale, as calmly as if he were selling castoff furniture. Nowadays there's no telling what astronomical prices dealers will pay for old masters. The main lot in the present sale was number 22, by Frans Hals, who died nearly 300 years ago. The seller of the portrait of a Cavalier, was Major Warde-Aldam. His great grandfather bought the picture for £15.
