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Press Arrangements

If at any time you are anxious to obtain a particular story, our P.R.O. may be able to help you to contact the right informants and provide you with any available background material.

Three telephones are installed in this tent for the sole use of Press Representatives; by arrangement with the G.P.O., calls are only accepted on these telephones at "reserved charges".

Buffer refreshments and drinks are available in the adjoining tent ; and we are happy to be able to extend this hospitality to all Press Representatives.

We will endeavour to make your difficult task as easy as possible.

Historical and General

This is, of course, a very important occasion in the Society's history. As will have been gathered from the fact that it is the Centenary Show, the Society was founded in 1861, and this is its 86th Show.

For this occasion, Her Majesty The Queen has graciously consented to accept Office as President; and to commemorate her Presidency, she has presented a Challenge Cup to the Society for the Best Pair and Female Champions in the Beef Breeds. In addition, she has once again presented a Replica of the King George VI Challenge Cup for the Champion Dairy Herd.

Her Majesty The Queen, accompanied by His Royal Highness The Duke of Edinburgh, will be visiting the Show on Friday, June 23rd. Details of the programme of this visit are issued separately. It is believed to be the first time that a Reigning Monarch has visited a Royal Counties Show.

Royal Patronage has been enjoyed in six reigns, including the present one. There have been many Royal Presidents, including Her Majesty Queen Victoria in 1899, and H.R.H. The Duke of Gloucester in 1953.

This is the fifth Royal Counties Show to be held in Windsor, the first of the series having been in 1872, and the most recent in 1924. The interval since 1924 may seem a long one, but it should be remembered that past visits to Berkshire have been shared with Reading, and also that the Royal Shows of 1939 and 1954 rather interfered with the programme. Up to and including 1924, the Shows were held in the Home Park, where the Royal Windsor Horse Show is now held; but that site, even if available, would not now be large enough. For the use of the present site the Society are indebted to the Crown Estate Commissioners.

The Royal Counties Show is "migratory" or "peripatetic" holding its Show in a different town each year. Exactly what constitutes a "Royal County" is debatable, but it appears that originally this referred only to the Counties of Hampshire and Berkshire. When Royal Patronage was first granted in 1871, the title then adopted was "The Royal Counties (Hants & Berks) Agricultural Society. Up to that date, and from then until 1880, all shows were held in those two counties: the 1881 show at Salisbury was the first outside them, and caused the words "Hants & Berks" to be dropped from the title.

In recent years, the Society has held shows in Wiltshire, Hampshire, Surrey, Dorset and Sussex. Last year's Show was at Salisbury, 1959 at Portsmouth, 1958 at Winchester, 1957 at Guildford, 1956 at Poole, and 1955 at Horsham.

The usual question will be asked about the attendance that is expected at the Show. This is impossible to forecast, particularly in view of the length of time that has elapsed since the last visit to Windsor; and as always, much depends on the weather. Normally, a total of 60,000 is required to cover expenses; but this year the special programme and other arrangements for the Centenary have involved so much expenditure that even 80,000 would not be sufficient; and indeed even the most optimistic do not really expect the show to "break even" financially. Attention is called to the fact that these figures, and indeed all figures issued by the Society, are for PAID ATTENDANCE ONLY. This is the principal adopted by the majority of major Show Societies, and excludes the Members of the Royal Counties and Hackney Horse Societies (2,900), holders of Exhibitors and Exhibitors Staff Tickets (5,200) and holders of Complimentary (including Press!) Tickets (3,200) - a total of 11,300. The reason for adhering strictly to Paid Attendance is that this is the only figure which can be accurately computed; the inclusion of any other categories involves estimation or guesswork and is therefore considered unsatisfactory for comparative purposes. It is requested that reports on the Show shall emphasise that the attendance figures are for Paid Attendance.

The total cost of staging the Show is expected to approach £50,000, of which over £8,000 is paid in Prize Money. The Local Committee have raised an excellent Local Prize Fund of nearly £1,500, and this is a very welcome contribution towards the expenses.

#### Future Shows and Amalgamation

The 1962 Show is to be held at Petworth, Sussex, in conjunction with the Sussex County Agricultural Society, and the 1963 Show at Poole, Dorset, on the joint invitation of the Corporations of Poole and Bournemouth.

There have been widespread reports regarding the possible amalgamation with the Bath & West & Southern Counties Society. The present position is that the amalgamation has been approved in principle by the Members of the Bath & West; and a similar resolution is to be considered by the Members of the Royal Counties at a Special General Meeting on the Show Ground at 11 a.m. on Thursday, June 22nd. Copies of this Resolution can be obtained from the P.R.O.

If the resolution is passed, then the way is clear for the details to be settled - many of them have already received consideration by the Councils of the two Societies and the joint working-party which they set up some six months ago. At the moment, the following comments may be made -

- (a) It is intended that the first Show of the New Society shall be held in 1964.
- (b) No decision has yet been reached on the title.
- (c) It is intended that there shall ultimately be a permanent Show Site; but no site; has yet been selected, and it is a matter of conjecture whether any such site will be available by 1964. The location of the site has also not yet been definitely determined, but it seems likely to be somewhere on the "boundary" between the two Societies.

#### Personalities

The Deputy President for 1961 is The Honourable David Smith, Lord Lieutenant of Berkshire, and he will be at the Show on each of the four days. Last year's President was Major J.G. Morrison, M.P., T.D., M.F.H.,

The Chairman of the Royal Counties Society is Sir Dymoke White, Bart., of Southleigh Park, Havant, Hants. While Sir Dymoke's name is a household word in Hampshire both as a landowner and in Local Government, he is, of course, best known in the Show world as the doyen of the Coaching Club; and he will once again be driving his team at Windsor on Wednesday.

The Chairman of the Local Committee has been Alderman J.S. Davis, Mayor of Windsor 1960/61; Major General E. Hakewill-Smith and Mr. Geoffrey Cross have been Chairman of the Local Publicity and Finance Committees respectively. The Joint Local Honorary Secretaries are Mr. Stephen Cross, Mr. Gilbert Lidstone and Mr. George Sherriff; Mr. Sherriff is, of course, a partner on the firm of Buckland & Sons, and it is interesting to note that this firm has provided a Local Honorary Secretary at all Royal Counties Shows at Windsor since 1899. The Local Honorary Treasurer is Mr. E.F. Elstone, Manager of the Windsor Branch of Lloyds Bank.

The President of the Hackney Horse Society is Mr. H.W. Dawes, C.B.E., F.R.C.V.S., of Castle Bromwich. He has been connected with that Society for many years, particularly in connection with Veterinary services.

#### Opening Ceremony

As usual, and according to very old tradition, this will be a civic occasion. The Ceremony will take place outside the Royal Pavilion (Stand 106) at 12 noon on Wednesday, 21st June (although the Show will have been open to the Public since 9 a.m. that day) and will be performed by His Worship The Mayor of Windsor, who will be accompanied in state by the Aldermen and Councillors of the Windsor Corporation, and its Principal Officers.

The Civic Party will be received by the Deputy President and the Society's Reception Stewards; and after the Mayor has declared the Show open, the Deputy President will reply on behalf of the Society.

Following the Opening Ceremony, the Mayor and Corporation will be entertained to lunch in the Council Pavilion; and at this lunch there will also be present officials of the Society, including the Judges, the Council of the Hackney Horse Society, and a number of prominent people from the district.

On Thursday, the President of the Hackney Horse Society will be entertaining in the Council Pavilion.

On Friday, the Royal Counties again gives a Luncheon in the Council Pavilion on the occasion of The Queen's visit: for details, see separate programme.

At none of these lunches will there be any speeches.

A comparative table of entries is attached. Although no overall record is claimed, it will be seen that these are highly satisfactory, and in a number of cases the highest for several years.

In the Cattle Section, Channel Island Breeds are again the strongest, but Jerseys with a massive entry of 170 animals have this year a long lead over Guernseys with 113. The latter are in fact, hard pressed by Ayrshires with 105. In the Beef Breeds, the Aberdeen-Angus entry of 84 is certainly a record for the Royal Counties.

Hampshire Downs once again lead the Sheep with 51 entries, with Dorset Down again runner-up with 42. Unfortunately, lack of support has made it necessary to cancel the Dorset Horn Classes.

In the Pig Section, the order is as last year, viz. Large White (109), Landrace (99) and Wessex Saddleback (89); and these three breeds account for 297 out of the total pig entry of 380. Entries in the Recorded Classes are rather disappointing - only 20 in the two. There is an excellent entry of 87 in the Bacon Carcase Competition: this is staged on Stand No.194 under the auspices of Henry Denny & Sons Ltd.,

#### Hackney Horse Society

As for many years past, the Hackney Horse Society holds its annual Show in conjunction with the Royal Counties, and times of judging will be found in the Ring Programme.

There are 163 entries in the Harness Classes, and 46 entries in the In-hand Classes, and it is thought that this must be approaching a record; they are certainly the strongest classes that will be seen at any show this year.

#### Horse Ring Programme

As will be seen from the Daily Programme (see pages 15 and 17 in the Catalogue), sometimes over 70 events will take place in Horse Ring during the four days, and there is a continuous programme from morning to evening.

To add variety, in addition to the Parades of Prize-Winning Cattle on Thursday and Friday, there are the following events -

- Displays by The King's Troop, R.H.A., each afternoon and evening.
- Parades of Farm Machinery, Old & New, each afternoon
- Parades of Hounds on Thursday, Friday and Saturday afternoons

## Coaching Marathon and Private Driving Marathon
