

This race is intended for high-performance powerboats suitable for extended cruising, including open sea passages. It is a non-stop race between Cowes, Isle of Wight, and Torquay, and follows a Course eastwards from Cowes, thence by way of turning marks offshore in the vicinity of:- Spithead, Bracklesham Bay, Sandown Bay, Bournemouth Bay, Weymouth Bay, Start Bay.

The "off" will be in the form of a 'rolling' mass start: there is no handicapping. All competitors will have an opportunity to compete for the various class awards which are being offered in addition to the main prize for the outright winner.

There are rigid eligibility requirements regarding length, displacement, hull shape, accommodation, engines and safety equipment.

The Race takes place on Saturday, August 19th, weather conditions permitting. If there is fog or a gale warning in force in forecast areas Wight, Portland, Plymouth, it may be necessary to postpone the race until Sunday, August 20th.

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HOW THE RACE CAME ABOUT

The immense development of boating as a popular sport during the post-war years is reflected in the tremendously successful series of Boat Shows presented by the Daily Express annually since 1954. Boating of every type now enjoys a greater popularity than ever before, and most boating enthusiasts have excellent facilities for competition and the improvement it brings.

Sailing dinghies, bigger yachts and lightweight speed boats all have their national and club competitions, but there is another class of craft which has advanced powerboat design since the War and does not enjoy such encouragement - or did not, until the idea of the Offshore Powerboat Race was conceived.

This exciting new development - the high-performance powerboat capable of extended cruising on the open sea - obviously has a great future, given the necessary stimulus. And so for the very first time in Europe a really severe, high-speed test of boats, engines and seamanship, has been organised.

This is the 1961 International Daily Express Offshore Powerboat Race.

RACE ORGANISATION

The race on August 19th promises to be the biggest, most exciting event of its kind ever to be held in Europe. Much work has been done in readiness for this marathon 150-mile dash from Cowes to Torquay.

Control centres, patrol craft, warning systems, turning marks, a search-and-rescue organisation, race information boards at points along the route have been prepared. The Royal Yacht Squadron, the Royal Motor Yacht Club, the Royal Torbay Yacht Club, the Services, Coast Guard Stations and several seaside resort authorities have all given valuable assistance to the organisers.

Race Control and Press Information Centres have been set up in the Royal Yacht Squadron's Annexe at Cowes and in the Imperial Hotel at Torquay. The Squadron has kindly consented also to the use of its starting line:

With willing co-operation from the seaside towns en route, arrangements have been made for the craft in the race to come close enough inshore for spectators to get a good view with safety.

Small boat sailors and swimmers will be warned by marshals from co-operating yacht clubs along the coast.

Units of the Royal Navy, the R.A.S.C. and Royal Air Force and the Coast Guard also have an important part in the event, providing a search and rescue organisation and course surveillance teams.

PRIZES

The prize for the first boat home is the 1961 Beaverbrook Challenge Trophy and £1,000.

The specially designed Trophy takes the form of a solid silver laurel wreath encircling a heavily gold-plated propeller, set in tinted crystal glass ground and cut to suggest turbulent coastal waters, and the base is of serpentine stone from the Lizard.

Other prizes will be awarded by the Daily Express to the owners of boats completing the Course, in the following categories:-

First Diesel-engined boat £100

First Diesel-engined beat under 15 litres engine capacity. £100

First Petrol-engined boat under 5½ litres engine capacity.. £100

Each boat completing the Course - A Daily Express Powerboat Race Plaque

Individual specially cast silver medallions will be awarded to the driver of each boat winning a cash prize and to the first lady to complete the course.

VIEWING POINTS

Given good weather conditions a vast number of spectators will be watching the race from various vantage points along the coast. At such points, and at several important seaside resorts, up-to-the-minute Race Information Boards will be set up, together with loud speakers in some instances, so that the public may know the overall position throughout the day.

The course - coming close to the shore during its first 70 miles or so - will allow a very good view from land. The latter half of the course is across Lyme Bay, direct from Portland Bill to the final turning point in Start Bay.

South Parade Pier and Front, Southsea.

Bracklesham Bay.

Piers and Fronts at Sandown, Shanklin and Ventnor.

Headlands of St. Catherine's Point and The Needles.

The Old Harry Rocks.

Durlston Head.

St. Albans Head

Greenhills, Sea Front and Harbour, Weymouth

BILLY BUTLIN TO PILOT 50 m.p.h. RACING BOAT To be given to the Outward Bound Trust

Mr. Billy Butlin is to present his powerboat "B.B." to the Outward Bound Trust at the finish of the International Offshore Powerboat Race on Saturday 19th August. The boat is a Huntsman 28 built by the Fairey Aviation Company with a scheduled speed of over 45 m.p.h. It has been especially equipped for the Race with two 280 h.p. Chrysler V.8 petrol engines, and its top speed will not be divulged until after the Race. Mr. Billy Butlin and Peter Twiss, the supersonic speed airman, will co-pilot the "B.B." during her gruelling 150 mile race from Cowes to Torquay.

Mr. Butlin's final practice "run" is on Thursday at Cowes, Isle of Wight (August 17th), when he will don his new specially made oil skins and demonstrate his boat skill to Press and Television.

Mr. Butlin is also giving £500 per year, for five years, to pay for the boat's maintenance. The Outward Bound Trust in acknowledging his great generosity announces its intention to put the craft into service at one of its Schools as a safety boat, for which task its exceptional sea-going qualities will be an asset. Some conversion may be needed for the sake of economy, but even if this means a reduction in speed the boat will still be faster and have a far greater range than the safety boats now in use.

Two of the Outward Bound Schools feature Seamanship as part of the 26 day adventure courses, for which the Trust is well-known and which are designed to develop latent qualities of character, such as initiative, courage, endurance and self-reliance.

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Most of the Sea Training is done in sail cutters, which are handled by the boys in coastal waters in all kinds of weather. Given only the elementary skills of sailing, the boys experience moments when their sturdiest qualities are challenged by adverse and sometimes dangerous conditions. Whilst the cutters are not easily capsized they frequently get off course or go aground and the School safety boats manned by an Instructor and boys on the course are always on call to tow them into quieter waters.

The plans are for Mr. Butlin to present the "B.B." to Admiral Sir Geoffrey Miles, K.C.B., K.C.S.I., representing the Outward Bound Trust at the Race Headquarters at the Imperial Hotel, Torquay at the finish of the race, whatever the result.

The Trust's representative states "Mr.Butlin's enterprise and courage are well-known, as is his generosity. His gift of this brilliant and valuable boat to Outward Bound will provide a challenge to our boys to follow his example and is precisely in the spirit which we seek to generate."
