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More than 3,000,000 people will have spent their holidays in caravans by the time the summer has ended. At the same time more than 250,000 people spend their lives permanently in caravans.

Today life in a caravan is vastly more refined and pleasant than it could have been made even five or six years ago by reason of the greatly improved design and the space-saving and labour saving equipment which is now available.

Indeed, for young folk set upon purchasing a home of their own a caravan has, economically, certain inherent advantages over, shall we say a bungalow. When a caravan is acquired it is furnished. The bungalow is empty. Whatever the comparative merits of bungalow or caravan as residences this is a factor of considerable importance when a first home is being sought.

But developments both in design and in the invention and adaptation of every form of furnishing and domestic equipment has become so very rapid that improvements and even luxuries come into existence and are enjoyed by the few before the ordinary individual is aware of their existence.

At the third International Caravan Exhibition, which will open at Earls Court on September 20, everything that is newest in the whole caravan world will be seen displayed in a really brilliant setting.

Over 200 caravans, covering the whole range of size and design, will be shown against a background as natural and true to life as can be devised in an exhibition hall. On passing through the main entrance visitors will find themselves walking through a beautifully laid out garden filled with colourful blooms and shrubs, an environment by no means unusual in the location of caravans.

At the opposite end of the long aisle will be seen a village of shops in front of which a semi-circular parade is made by the presence of a large circular green lawn.

Between these two attractive features enclosing each end of the Hall will be the long lines of Stands upon which will be exhibited the vast varieties of caravans which are the very essence of the Exhibition.

The refinements and amenities of life are of as much interest and significance to caravan dwellers as to those whose domestic lives are spent in more permanent dwellings. Therefore, the Organisers of the Exhibition have enriched it with displays designed to implement all the most important aspects of home life.

At least three times a day visitors will be able to see a fashion show presented by Acrilan in the ample space in front of the Village of shops. The emphasis of design in the fashions shown will, naturally, be on casual wear. Formal wear is common to all of us.

In the Village Fanny and Johnnie Cradock, of Bon Viveur international fame, will give demonstrations of cooking particularly suitable both of substance and method to the caravan kitchen. Fanny and Johnnie Cradock's experience is really great and one will learn as much from them on the subject of the foods to buy when living in a caravan as concerning the art of making them nourishing and toothsome.

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One of the most interesting features at the Exhibition will be that in which a caravan will be seen in various stages of construction. All day and every day throughout the duration of the Exhibition two caravans will be seen growing to completion under the handiwork of craftsmen.

A caravan similar to these will be offered as a prize to the winner in a competition which is open exclusively to visitors to the Exhibition. The value of this caravan, with some extra equipment, will be £500.

The National Caravan Council has issued special invitations to all Town Clerks and Deputy Town Clerks in the country to attend the Exhibition.

I thought you might be interested in some general information about this year's International Caravan Exhibition, organised by the "Daily Mail", which will take place at Earls Court from 20th to 30th September. The Press View will be from 3 to 6 pm on the 19th.

Amongst the highlights of the show are cookery demonstrations for caravanners by Fanny and John Cradock (the Bon Viveur team), and a Daily Mail Fashion Show of Caravan Casuals by Acrilan. nThe theme for the fashion display will be casual wear co-ordinates (the perfect capsule wardrabe for caravanning) for both men and women. The setting will be a colourful centre of a typical English village, with the mannequins parading on the 'village green'. There will be three shows daily - at 11.30 a.m., 3.45 pm and 7.15 pm. On Press Day it is at 3.30 pm only.

Also, Amstel will have a <u>stand for foreign buyers who might</u> require credit facilities of one kind or another, either to finance caravans or equipment pending sale, or to enable them to offer their customers, in turn, hire purchase or similar credit terms. This organisation, known as the Amstel Club, is a group of leading financial institutions (12 in Western Europe and one in the U.S.) who have entered into reciprocal agreements for the financing of imports and exports between their respective countries. The 13 members are Austr ia, Belgium, Denmark, France, Western Germany, Holland, Italy, Norway, Portugal, Sweden, Switzerland, the United States and the United Kingdom. The UK member is the United Dominions Trust.

Perhaps you will let me know if you require Press tickets for the Press View on the 19th September, or for subsequent days, and whether you are likely to be able to do anything in the newsreel.
