Launch of the Guided Missile Destroyer KENT

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One of the oldest ship names in the Royal Navy will be brought back into service this month when Her Royal Highness Princess Marina Duchess of Kent, launches the KENT, the third of the Royal Navy's guided missile destroyers, at the Belfast shippard of Harland & Wolff Ltd.

The launch will take place at 1 p.m. on Wednesday 27th September, the religious ceremony being conducted by the Reverend R. Kilpatrick, W.M.A., Vicar of Ballymacarrett.

The KENT, a County class destroyer, was laid down in March 1960. She is expected to join her sister ships the HAMPSHIRE and the DEVONSHIRE in the Fleet in 1963.

Besides providing guided weapon anti-aircraft defence for task groups, the County class destroyers will be able to fulfil all the operational roles expected of conventional ships of this size.

With a standard displacement of over 5,000 tons, an overall length of 520 feet and a beam of 54 feet the KENT will carry the following armament:

One "Seaslug" guided weapons system with a twin launcher.
Four radar controlled 4.5 inch guns in twin mountings situated forward.

Two "Seacat" close range guided weapons systems fitted abaft the after funnel.

For anti-submarine work the ship will be fitted with the latest underwater detection equipment and a Westland Wessex Helicopter carrying dipping asdic and homing torpedoes.

The propulsion machinery consists of two sets of geared steam turbines for normal steaming conditions, with gas turbines to provide additional boost for high speeds and for getting quickly under-way in harbour. The steam turbines were manufactured by Messrs. Harland and Wolff and Associated Electrical Industries, and the gas turbines by Messrs. Harland and Wolff. Stabilisers will be fitted which, among their uses, will facilitate the operation of the helicopter in adverse weather conditions.

The KENT will have the latest air and surface warning radars. Her bridge will afford the Captain a clear all round view combined with the best possible weather protection. The combined operations room and weapon direction room is fitted with electronic plotting facilities.

Accommodation for her complement of about 32 officers and 400 ratings will be at a very high standard. The mess decks are fitted with bunks arranged so as to provide the maximum recreation space in each mess, while allowing for such fittings as card and writing tables and cupboards.

The whole ship will be air conditioned and have large dining halls served by a modern galley, capable of providing varied meals on a self-service system.

This will be the ninth ship to bear the name KENT. The eighth, broken up in 1948, was one of the famous County class, 8 inch gun cruisers which served with such distinction during World War Two.

POINTS WHICH THE PRIME MINISTER PROPOSES TO MAKE AT THE LUNCHEON FOLLOWING THE LAUNCH OF H.M.S. KENT ON WEDNESDAY, 27th SEPTEMBER, 1961, AT 1.30 p.m.

On behalf of the Government I am delighted to welcome H.R.H. Princess Marina and to thank her for honouring us with her presence here to-day, which is in accord with the high sense of public service we always associate with members of the Royal Family. It is a pleasure to have the First Lord of the Admiralty and Lady Carrington and all the other guests who have come from England for this happy occasion.

There is no one in Northern Ireland who is not well aware of the tremendous importance of the sea lanes leading to the United Kingdom. The struggle to keep them open during the last war was a bitter one with heavy casualties among ships and seamen. We all hope that we shall never have to face in the future a similar conflict. But we must be prepared. The armed services must be equipped with the best possible weapons.

It is particularly appropriate that anti-submarine destroyers should be built in Northern Ireland because here we also have the anti-submarine Training School used by the Navies of the N.A.T.O. powers. Our shipyards have valuable experience of building ships for the Royal Navy, the Royal Canadian Navy and the Indian Navy - aircraft carriers, cruisers, destroyers, frigates, corvettes and minesweepers.

We are proud of the great naval ships built here, proud of our association with the Royal Navy and proud that H.M.S. Kent, the ninth ship in naval history to bear the name, is being built by Ulster hands and with Ulster skill.

H.M.S. Kent embodies many of the latest developments in air and surface warning radar and in underwater detection equipment. At the same time the comfort and well-being of the ship's company have not been forgotten. The crew of the first Kent built nearly 300 years ago would be surprised to see the modern crew's quarters.

During the two hundred years or so in which Britain fought in Europe to preserve the balance of power, successive Kents in the Royal Navy won resounding battle honours - in the war in which Master Jenkins found an effective if macabre way of advertising naval grievances by sending his severed ear, wrapped in cotton wool, to Members of Parliament, in actions against the Spaniards in the West Indies, and in the Mediterranean during the long campaign against Napolean in the China seas and in the first and second world wars.

We hope that this modern Kent - whose name will always be associated with that of Her Royal Highness with us to-day - will add to the store of naval tradition and service and lustre to the name she bears.
