## WINGS OF MERCY

Kenya's year-long drought, the worst for over 70 years, had already brought many farmers in this East Africa territory to the verge of starvation. Then the rains came. Not the crop-swelling rains so long awaited, but torrential downpours bringing floods and disaster in their wake.

A vast area of over 2,000 square miles was engulfed. 500,000 Kenyans, mostly farmers and their families, were in imminent danger of starvation.

The already desperate situation had assumed the proportions of a major disaster. Roads, railways, and bridges were destroyed - whole villages were swept away or completely cut off.

To meet the emergency a full scale operation was immediately mounted by the Royal Air Force, to drop food and medical supplies to the stricken Africans. Local based transport planes were soon joined by others flown in from Britain and the Middle East. Meanwhile a similar situation had arisen in Somalia.

Working together, the Army, Navy, and Royal Air Force have already dropped well over 2,000 tons of supplies in Kenya and Somalia.

This rescue operation was backed by widespread help in cash from the people of Britain and other Commonwealth countries, and food supplies also came from the Governments of Britain, America, and the Central African Federation.

The Governor of Kenya, Sir Patrick Bannister, told men of the British Forces, "Without you, there is no doubt thousands would have died".
