General View of Test Drilling area from roadway.							
Various shots showing temporary nature of site headquarters, which consist of one large hut in course of erection, two canvas roofed huts, a caravan and another canvas roofed hut. The ground around the huts has been churned up by recent snow, frost and rain.							
General View of "Churn" drill with temporary drying cauldrons in foreground. The procedure is that when the drilling has gone to a certain depth, a special "bit" is lowered into the drilling, this comes up with a sample, in liquid or mud form, within the "bit". The sample is released into a bucket, which is then emptied into a type of "Funnel" from which it goes into a "cauldron", consisting of a tar barrel cut in half. The "Cauldron" is then placed over a portable gas fire, and the water evaporated by boiling and stirring. The resultant powder is then placed in bags and sent away for analysis. It is from this that the results set out in the press have been obtained. The "cauldrons" have been described to me as a "smelting plant", but its not a term I'd like to use about them.
