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Her Majesty was met at Liverpool Street Station by Mr.
Marples, who presented her to Dr. Beeching (Chairman) and Sir Philip
Warter (Deputy Chairman) of the British Transport Commission. The
Queen was to see something of the work behind the scenes of the
Eastern Region of British Railways. A special train took her to
Stratford to see the Diesel Engine Repair Shop and maintenance depot.
It was a chance for railway workers to meet the Queen in unusual
circumstances, and for her to see some of the men who keep the trains
running.

Part of the general Railways expansion scheme, Temple Mills Yard were completed in 1959, and cost £3.1 million.
